1-1-Like

Like can be a verb or a preposition.

1-1-1-Like as a verb

1-1-1-Like as a verb followed by -ing and to with a change of meaning.

Examples:

- (a)-I like going out at the weekend(general enjoyment).
- (b)-I like to sit and read(habits and preferences).
- 1-1-1-2-It has a person as the subject.

Example:

- -I like modern art.
- 1-1-2-Like as a preposition: It has an object after it.

Examples:

- (a)She was wearing a hat like mine.
- (b)You are behaving like children.

1-As is used for real similarity.	1- <i>Like</i> is used for

2-As is used as a conjunction	
followed by a subject and a verb.	

Examples: (a)Do as <u>I say</u> and sit down (b)Do not eat and speak at the same time as <u>my mother used</u> to say.	
3-We use as in the expressions <i>as</i>	
usual	
and as we know.	
Examples:	
(a) As we know, we are leaving at 10	
o'clock.	
(b)Pat and Peter arrived late, <u>as</u>	
usual.	
4-We use <i>as</i> in comparison,	
especially to compare two persons	
or things having the same quality	
Asas Pattern:	
S+as+Adj+as+Com	
Example:	
She is <u>as beautiful as</u> her mother.	

1-3-What...like?

1-This construction is used for description or an impression and we do not use like in the answer.

Examples:

Question	Answer
What's London like?	It is quite big, and it's very
	interesting(Correct).
Not It's like quite big(Incorrect).	

Note: We can use *like* in an answer in comparison.

Examples:

- (a) What's London like? -It's like New York, but without the tall buildings. (b)-What's Layla like? -She's just like her mother. 1-4-How....? The construction *how...?* is used to explain the following: 1-4-1-It is used to ask about the present condition of something that can change. Example: -How's the work these days? -It is better than last year. 1-4-2-It is used to ask about people's health. Example: -How's Peter? -He's fine. 1-4-3-It is used to ask about people's reactions and feelings. Examples: -How's the weather?
- -How's the weather?

-How's your meal?

-What's the weather like?

Note: In asking about the weather, we use both questions:
